From the desk of the President, Edyth Irvine

Christopher Platt is the new Mono County Office of Education Library Director. In order for MLFOL members to become better acquainted with Christopher, I had a chat with him recently about his background and his library insights. Here is what I gathered.

Christopher was born and raised in Bishop, California. After graduate school he worked in three major libraries in the United States, most recently in New York City. He has traveled around the world visiting libraries; and after 25 years in various library roles, he has returned to the area to give back to this community.

Christopher shared with me an e-mail he wrote to the library staff recently, it included: "The most effective and important resource any public library has is the relationship between the staff member and the patron. All our best thinking in programs, strategies, collections, processes and guidelines culminates in those moments when you're checking out books, telling a story to a group of toddlers, helping them navigate technology, greeting people as they come and go. My main job is to support staff in making these moments as effective as possible, not just to help you be successful but, because to most people, you are the face of the library, not me." In my opinion, the e-mail tells much of his philosophy and style of management.

During our discussion several areas were covered:

• Libraries are an important community gathering space where people can come to hold meetings, discuss ideas and issues, get away from other distractions to focus on work or studying, and better themselves. A lesson he took away from library use skyrocketing during and after the 2009 recession is that, beyond people borrowing more materials than they would have otherwise purchased on their own, they came in to spend time in a space that made them feel like they were accomplishing something when they were out of work. Coming in to read a book, bringing their resume up to date, learning a new computer program, etc. made them feel like they were accomplishing something rather than sitting at home staring at the walls. And doing so in a library meant that they were around others bettering themselves, and no one had known they were laid off or struggling to find employment. He knows people still use the library for that reason.

- Reading is fundamental. Christopher is a big believer in the power of reading, regardless of the format the book is in or what is read. Reading non-fiction can increase a person's knowledge or perspective on an issue and spark curiosity. We know reading novels builds empathy for others from different backgrounds and inspires creativity. We know young children reading at grade level in elementary school are more likely to be successful in school and higher education as they grow older. A Book Trust study indicates young adults who read regularly are more likely to be successful in work and content in life as they age into adulthood.
- Christopher believes in reading visibly. His email signature contains a book recommendation. He asks people what they're reading on a regular basis. Our Library Staff 2018 Top Picks, linked on the library's website, is a way to show the diversity of reading tastes and recommendations of staff across the county. Our library car now has a license plate bracket that states "Follow me to the library" and "READ!" He encourages everyone to actively and regularly talk about what they are reading it doesn't have to be limited to book clubs and it doesn't have to happen only in the library!

- Our Mammoth Lakes staff is trying out a Facebook book discussion group around the Sarah Jessica Parker book club to encourage a new digital venue for talking about reading and books, which can include anyone from any part of the county and can play out over time rather than in just one meeting. Sarah Jessica's pick this time is "Heartland" by Sarah Smarsh. Anyone who is reading the book is invited to join. A few copies are available for the club at the library but if you bought the book or checked it out from a different library, you can still participate!
- Christopher sees an opportunity to refresh our children and young adult collections and look for opportunities to increase programs in those areas. We have a great early literacy outreach program in Raising A Reader to get the youngest children and families into the reading habit. He is actively working with his team and colleagues to explore what more they can do for older children and young adults.
- Christopher attended the Foro Latino the other night and was excited to see so many young families in attendance and encouraged them to use their library, providing card applications in English and Spanish.
- Finally, he strongly believes that any individual who wants to change something, whether it's something personal in their life or change the world, can get a good head start on it at their local library. In that sense, the local library is a visible demonstration of a strong, courageous society.
- At the time of this chat he had only been on the job two months and looks forward to connecting with more community stakeholders, garnering more feedback, and welcoming community members who would like to volunteer in library programs. Christopher said that individuals interested in volunteering should contact either Doug Oldham, the Mammoth Lakes Librarian, or himself.

The most current book Christopher has read is a novel by Sarah Perry, titled "Melmoth"; he described the book as having a compelling main character and inspiring self-reflection. He had a book on the table that he had just chosen from the New Fiction area of the Library, titled "Big Week: The Biggest Air Battle of World War II" by James Holland.

All of Christopher's correspondence ends with a book recommendation. He believes people should share and talk about what they are reading.

I am currently reading "Crowded in the Middle of Nowhere" by Dr. Bo Brock. This book is on the Top Picks of 2018. And, I recently finished "Becoming" by Michelle Obama.

Do stop by Christopher's office upstairs at the Mammoth Lakes Library and introduce yourself.

MLFOL SCHOLARSHIPS

Do you know a spring graduate attending MHS who is planning to start college in the fall? MLFOL can help with book expenses. Up to 10 graduating seniors are awarded book scholarships for their freshman fall semester. The MLFOL scholarship fund has a total of \$2,000 for this purpose. Students who qualify have:

==> An active library card they have used to check out materials (not for computer use) in the 12 months prior to their application.

==> Submitted the community scholarship request form provided by the MHS counseling staff.

==> Attended MHS or the Independent Learning Center for 3 out of 4 years.

==> A minimum 3.0 grade point average.

Students who have been library volunteers or been community volunteers beyond the MHS community service requirements will receive special consideration, as will students who submit an outstanding personal essay.

An all-volunteer Tax-Aide program will be operating during tax season in the Ellie Randol Reading Room at the Mammoth Library. The program is a partnership between the AARP Tax-Aide Foundation and the Mammoth Lakes Library. It offers free tax help, preparation, and e-filing during February, March, and April through the end of tax season on April 15th. The program operates on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M.

The AARP free Tax-Aide program assists low-tomoderate income taxpayers in Mono and Inyo Counties. Sue Stavlo is the district coordinator for AARP Tax Aide in addition to being the Mammoth Lakes local coordinator. In the district are two free Tax-Aide centers; one in Mammoth at the Mammoth Lakes Library and the other in Bishop at the Northern Inyo Hospital Birch Street Annex. Across the district are 28 volunteers. Each year in January, the volunteers are trained and certified through the IRS/AARP training program in the current year's tax laws and software.

What to bring when you visit our Tax-Aide site:

– Social security cards or ITIN documents for yourself and your dependents and a Picture ID

– Tax statements; W-2 forms, 1099-G (unemployment), SSA-1099, 1099-R, 1099-INT, 1099-DIV, 1099-MISC, broker statements, etc.

– Medical insurance information for all persons on the tax return, including form 1095-A if insurance purchased through Covered California

 If direct deposit desired, bring account information (routing and account numbers)

- Copy of last year's income tax return (if available)

- Child care provider information (name, provider's SSN or EIN, address, and phone)

- If itemizing deductions, bring past 2 years property tax bills, form 1098 for mortgage interest, DMV statement or car registration, medical expenses, charitable deductions, new vehicle invoice, etc.

About AARP Tax Help:

The Mammoth Library Tax-Aide site has seven computers and fourteen volunteers (three Spanish speaking). Last year, over 500 tax returns were prepared and filed. These volunteers help people with a wide variety of tax situations, including various forms of income, unemployment, education credits, earned income credit, child tax credit, dependent care deductions, renters credit, itemized deductions, investment sales, and small businesses (that do not have a loss, depreciation, or expenses exceeding \$25,000).

We encourage all taxpayers to file early even if they potentially owe money as those payments are not due until April 15th, regardless of when they file their tax return.
