JANES WALES.

The Los Angelos Herald announce that General George Stoneman has received his commission as one of the Board of Indian Commissoners, and has forwarded his acceptance to Washington, and says: After an examination of the law he finds that he can accept the Federal appointment, as no salary is attached to it. The law creating the Board provides that its members shall be sought for amongst the able and philanthropic citizens of the United States. The commission will involve a couple of trips to Washington during the year, and only the actual expenses of the Commissioners, certified under oath, are defrayed by the Government. Gen. Stoneman announces it to be his purpose to advo-cate the purchase of supplies for the Indians of the Pacific Coast on this coast, -instead of, as at present, in Philadelphia.

December 14th, General Joseh Lane, of Oregon, and his 78th year, and the Roseburg notes the event with the remark that the veteran warrior and statesman is in full health, with his mental faculties unimpaired. He has recently written a very interesting letter in advocacy of the measure before Congress to pass a bill to pension the survivors of the soldiers who served in the war with Mexico, in that Republic and in California. The old General is greatly honored by the people of Oregon, and his home is in Roseburg, Douglass county.

The Lyon county (Nevada) Times predicts that in 1880 the Comstock mines will be working more men than ever, and the community will be enjoying great prosperity. The "boom" it says, is long a-coming, but when it does come. it will be startling in extent and violence. Don't put it off longer than 1880, as the poor house accommodations in this State and Nevada are none of the best. But the insane asylums are in good order, which is quite assuring.

It is a matter of evidence, the Chicago Times asserts, that in many districts in Ireland the rents received by the landlords are not earned by the tenants, but by their relatives in America, who spare enough from their own resources to save the members of their family from eviction. MORE FALSEHOODS.

And now comes the Carson Appeal

of the 1st, with a long communication

from Bodie, under the signature of Index," but undoubtedly from the pen of R. D. Bogart, with a rehash of the lies recently given by him to the Bodie Standard in relation to Lake district. In the first paragraph of the Appeal article the writer says: "Your informant, who has spent some months in Mammoth City, one of the best known writers on mines and mining on the coast, is a shrewd observer and knows whereof he speaks." This admission proves beyond a doubt that the "informant" is Bogy. It was hardly necessary to make this admission, for any one acquainted with Bogart's peculiar style of writing will recognize it at a glance. We have once had occasion to deny his story. as given in the Bodie Standard, and had hoped that there would be no further necessity for alluding to the matter again. But as Bogart evidently courts notoriety, he shall have it. In the first place Bogart is an infamous liar-a very pointed term, and one he may not relish. His first quarrel with Superintendent Hardy (the entire cause of Bogart's disgust with the management of the Mammoth) was brought about by Bogart's desire to run the Mammoth mine, Superintendent and all. When he failed in this, he commenced his abuse of the district, which he still keeps up. His assertion that "Mammoth City is almost deserted, dozens of houses standing idle and a number of business houses closed for the winter," is so far true: One business house has closed, and one re-opened which has been closed the past two months; there is not a vacant dwelling house in the town, and there are as many men in town as when Bogart left, followed by the curses of half a hundred creditors -among whom was a compositor who stood by him when he needed a friend and to whom he lied worse than anyone else. Bogart, or "Index," (the two are identical) says "the only hope of making the Mammoth mine profitable is, first, the discovery of a paying ore body.", If our memory serves us right, this same Bogart was very anxious to invest in this worthless stock, and would have sold his old clothes, if he could have found a purchaser, to raise money with which to buy a share of Mammoth stock. That there has been some mistakes made in the manage ment may be true; but can Bogart point us to a mine management where fewer errors have been made or less money misspent? We think not. In conclusion, Bogart has abused the confidence of the people of Mammoth, even to the Chinaman who did his washing. His story as poured in the confiding car of the Standard man (largely sucked in and swallowed as it were) was a tissue of lies, and the "Index" story is, if anything, worse as regards truth. The two yarns are worthy the immaculate falsifier who concocted them. The Appeal man is evidently not acquainted with Bogart, and therefore is not to be censured for the publication of his scurrilous arti cle.

There is a fair prospect of war, it seems, over the political quarrel in Maine. Governor Garcelon is reported to be gathering arms and ammunition in anticipation of a clash. It is to be hoped that forcible measures will be avoided on either side, and that an amicable settlement of the difficulties will be had.

prospectus circular heralds the announcement that Virginia City is to give life to a new journal entitled the Nevada Monthly. It is to be issued in magazine form, and will principally treat on the mining, agricultural, industrial and literary interests of Nevada.

The Times Review of January 1st, publishes a statement of Tuscarora's output for 1879, which foots up over \$1,250,000. Dividends being paid to the amount of \$520,000. A very fair amount considering that only five mills shipped bullion at all.

Virginia Enterprise We find in the Boston Herald the dlowing: Ex-Secretary McCulloch aggests that the only way to push following: suggests that the only silver into general circulation is to resilver into general circulation is to re-tire all notes under \$10, this is to be done gradually, beginning with \$1 and \$2 bills. It is well known that the Bank of England issues no notes under £5. The natural result is that people carry gold sovereigns and sil-ver half crowns, two skilling pieces, shillings and sixpences for small change. The notes under \$10 in this country amount to about \$200,000,000, and their retirement would bring into use that amount of gold and sil-ver. We have already done away with the fractional currency, and sub-stituted silver for it, and the change proposed would hardly be greater. It is true that the small bills would be more convenient than the silver and gold would be, but the use of the silver and gold would, to a certain extent, obviate the danger of paper money." The foregoing is all well money. The foregoing is all well enough, except that it carries all through it the idea of nursing silver into circulation. Now silver is either it to be considered money or it is not. If it is yot, then all the nursing in the world will not make it money. The jeweler is glad to pay in gold for it a valuable consideration to obtain it for the manufacture of sticles which the world delights in. ... the other hand the authorities take a bit of paper three inches in width by seven inches in length and run it through a press and when it comes out men by the millions are ready to give a wenty dollar gold piece for it, because there has been printed upon it a promise that the Government will upon preentation give twenty dollars for entation give twenty donars for n. Had the figures and letters been a little changed, the same piece of paper would bring \$200 in gold just as readily as \$20. If the promise of the Government gives to a piece of paper a value so exalted, why will not the promise make of silver good y? Simply because the promise is not frankly given. The mints are open to receive as much gold as can be brought to them; but silver is hampered and badgered per-petually, lest there shall too much accumulate. When commerce and manufactures were in their infancy as compared with the present, there was in a few years poured into Europe a thousand millions of dollars in silver from Mexico and South America, and yet its value was hardly changed. The reason was because the whole world recognized it as money. Why should it not now? There is no reason except that certain wealthy men and corporations in England concluded that there was accumulating so much money that there was danger of a reduction in interest, and so they of a reduction in interest, and so they determined to demonetize either gold or silver. At last they determined that silver should, be the victim. They were able to carry the matter through Parliament because England has not a silver producing colony, though she has several silver-absorb-ing colonies. Her act was followed by the Dutch in Holland, and later by Germany and the United States, and the scare which this created drove the Latin Union to partial demonetization The result has been a load of hard ships to every nation engaged in the wrong. And to-day, in all the world, except in the Treasury of the United States, there is not a surplus of \$25,000,000 in silver which could be instantly commanded, while in Russia. Southeastern Europe, all Asia and all the Western Continent below our line it is the only measure of values. As commodity it is in our country a tle below par. The remedy is for e. Government of this country, backed by its 50,000,0000 of busy peo-ple who require three times as much money, per capita, for daily use as any other people, to say that silver is now to them, as it was in the days of Abraham, good money. As to its use in daily transactions, it is not re-quired except to make change with. in daily transactions, it is not required except to make change with. But because of its presence in the Treasury to-day the notes of the Government are worth their face in gold. Paper for Active 19 gold. Paper for daily use as money is the money of civilization. It only needs a specie backing. Let the country keep that backing, and when bills are returned to the Treasury under \$5, let them (for the sake of cleanlings) he supposed with your ones, give silver the same Government prestige that gold has, and the country will be satisfied and a reign of certain prosperity will succeed.

The value of the lead, added to that of gold and silver not passing through the hands of the Express Company, would largely increase the total value of the State's production. The year has been an off year for bullion production in Nevada, but, admitting the correctness of the figures for Colorado, which are doubtless exagerated, and adding the value of the lead and non-expressed bullion, which will increase the amount at least 3,000,000, and Nevada in one of its poorest years exceeds Colamount at least 3,000,000, and Nevada in one of its poorest years exceeds Col-orado by five or six millions. The pro-duct of Eureka district alone was nearly one-fourth of the entire product of the State of Colorado.
